

AAKP Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) Resources for Transplant Patients

This is a concerning and confusing time for all people, especially transplant patients, and information and guidance regarding COVID-19 is evolving. AAKP is constantly updating recommendations and resources. Please refer to them regularly and feel free to contact us if any questions.

- 1. <u>Frequently Asked Questions for Transplant Recipients and Candidates from the American</u> <u>Society of Transplantation</u>
- 2. Maintain at least a two-week supply of all medication, keeping in mind any dosage changes. Have your pharmacy phone number readily available.
- 3. Contact your transplant coordinator or physician immediately if experiencing a cough, fever, shortness of breath or other flu-like symptoms
- 4. Notify your transplant coordinator or physician immediately if you think you have been exposed to a person with COVID-19.
- 5. Do not go directly to the clinic, transplant center or emergency room if you are experiencing a cough or fever call ahead for instructions

Recommendations for transplant recipients, household members, persons on a waitlist and persons with end stage renal disease (ESRD)

- 1. Avoid non-essential travel or gatherings of ten persons or more
- 2. Maintain a distance of 6 feet between yourself and other people
- 3. Avoid public crowds and public transportation
- 4. Cough or sneeze into tissue or an elbow. Dispose of the tissue immediately in the trash and wash your hands
- 5. Avoid handshaking or touching your face
- 6. Wash your hands frequently with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Wash carefully building a nice lather and rinsing completely.
- 7. Hand sanitizer is a suitable substitute if handwashing is not available.
- 8. Disinfect touch points with EPA approved wipes or diluted bleach. (See <u>CDC recommendations</u> <u>for disinfectants</u>)
- 9. Increase ventilation by opening windows if feasible
- 10. Work from home if feasible
- 11. Avoid persons who are sick in the home and in the public

- 12. If a household member is infected with COVID-19 the infected person should wear a <u>surgical</u> <u>mask</u>, follow all <u>CDC recommendations</u>. The infected household member should be in a separate room and use separate bathroom facilities while ill and avoid contact with the transplant recipient. Alternative accommodations should be considered for the transplant recipient.
- 13. There are many claims and remedies being touted as cures or treatment for COVID-19. Do not self-medicate. Consult your physician or transplant coordinator before taking any new medications.
